Having become fluent in four languages, she enjoyed escorting her father to parties and receptions in Cuba, and Washington, and traveling to Rome to visit relatives.

In 1952, she met Hugh McDowell through mutual friends in New York. Hugh had recently been widowed and was the father of two young girls, Allie and Cookie. Yolanda and Hugh were soon happily married and moved to Wilson Point, South Norwalk, where their family grew to five children.
